AdvanceNC

AdvanceNC is a collaborative group of community colleges, universities, workforce development boards, and workforce partners in Central North Carolina engaging with employer stakeholders to support the development of a robust talent pipeline serving the regional manufacturing community.

Golden LEAF Foundation

The Golden LEAF Foundation was established in 1999 to administer a portion of the funds North Carolina received through the Master Settlement Agreement with cigarette manufacturers. Golden LEAF's mission is to increase economic opportunity in North Carolina's rural and tobacco-dependent communities through leadership in grantmaking, collaboration, innovation, and stewardship as an independent and perpetual foundation. For almost 25 years, the nonprofit has partnered with the state and with local governments and other foundations in pursuit of this mission.

Hometown Strong

Hometown Strong is an initiative dedicated to supporting the rural counties of North Carolina by providing resources and support to improve the quality of life for residents. Hometown Strong focuses on economic development, education, healthcare, and community engagement.

 <u>Rural Grant Program</u>: Hometown Strong provides direct, free-of-charge grantwriting support to rural towns, counties, and regions to increase federal funding for projects within North Carolina, offering a comprehensive approach to long-term financial planning through grant strategies that leverage federal, state, and private funds.

NC Office of Strategic Partnerships (OSP)

OSP develops, launches, and enhances partnerships between state government and North Carolina's research and philanthropic sectors. This includes elevating state government's internal capacity to use and generate

• <u>Child Care Business Liaison</u>: Funded by Invest Early NC in partnership with the NC Department of Commerce and the NC Department of Health and Human Services, the Child Care Business Liaison role was created under the state's economic development plan to help address the insufficient supply of high quality and affordable childcare in North Carolina. The Liaison works with businesses, local communities, and philanthropic organizations to research child care access solutions that could scale to serve communities in North Carolina, supports innovations like NC Tri-Share, and works with employers interested in investing in child care access solutions for their workers and communities.

State Employees' Credit Union Foundation (SECU Foundation)

The SECU Foundation promotes local and community development by primarily funding high impact projects in the areas of housing, education, healthcare and human services.
